- I. Program Update (Budziak & Przybyla)
  - a. Fall 2023 Enrollment
    - College up 9.4% since last fall
    - o CRJ up 122 credit hours (+25.4%) since fall 2022
  - b. Department Update (Przybyla)
    - o Criminal Law class has a real-life component built in
      - Class spent the afternoon at the Sycamore Courthouse with States Attorney Rick Amado
    - o CRJ implemented the degree completion program
      - Accept academy transcripts for college credit
      - Scholarship opportunities available
      - Program benefits those law enforcement candidates that do not have an associate degree
      - Correction Officers have more interest in the Degree Completion Program than sworn officers
  - c. Faculty & Staffing (Budziak)
    - Joseph Przybyla is serving as a full-time faculty member, and Kishwaukee staffs anywhere from 3-5 CRJ adjuncts
  - d. Spring 2024 Courses and Modalities (Przybyla)
    - Przybyla shared that the two modalities that work best for the criminal justice students are online asynchronous and hybrid
    - CRJ students prefer 8-week versus 16-week courses
    - The CRJ Internship course is the only non-8-week course
      - College is looking for opportunities to possibly convert into an 8-week internship course

## II. Employer Feedback & Discussion

- c. Course Modalities
  - Kishwaukee Education Consortium, (KEC), Instructor Scott Farrell, shared that the Criminal Justice courses are in-person with no online options
  - The committee shared that most students are working other jobs; the on-line/hybrid with 8-week course options work best and benefit the students
- d. Employment Opportunities/ Internships
  - The committee shared that there are many job opportunities; the issue they are finding is that the applicants are unable to meet the standards for the fitness test
    - Przybyla seconded that most candidates cannot pass the fitness test
    - Suggested that the college could hold the Power test on campus for students to practice
    - Eventually, could Kish be a campus where people could go to test?
    - Closest testing facility is in Joliet; the committee agreed this would be beneficial to offer both students and others
    - Wig shared that the Power Test standards have been lowered and candidates are still unable to pass the test
  - Leverton shared that they have had an increase in the number of applicants that are prepared for the oral interview; candidates arrive on time and are dressed appropriately
    - However, applicants are not being truthful and are failing the polygraph portion of the hiring process
    - Candidates lack writing and speaking skills

- Budziak shared with the committee that the college removed the 1 credit hour
   Internship Orientation requirement
  - The committee members were in agreement
